

A TOAST TO MRS. CONOLLY: THOUGHTS FROM THREE ASSISTANT DIRECTORS

In her first and last chapel sermons of 2004, Mrs. Conolly asked the camp to reflect on what they had packed in their trunks. In June, she pointed out that everyone's trunks held not only the necessities of living at camp for seven weeks, but also their hopes, dreams, and fears about the summer. In August, she pointed out that in addition to woodworking projects, wet towels, and smelly socks, everyone would be packing memories, a sense of pride, friendships, Onaway values, and lessons accumulated over their seven weeks at camp. It was the intangibles that had to be packed most carefully, but they were also the things that had to be unpacked and used the most when we got home. Mrs. Conolly said, "Promise me that you will not leave anything in the trunk that you can use during the year." And so, we would like to keep that promise by sharing some of the lessons that we have unpacked after our summers with Mrs. Conolly and how we have used them in our lives.

Even in the face of the many unpredictables that can occur over the course of a summer at camp microbursts, head lice, homesickness, bear sightings, pranks - Mrs. Conolly was unflappable. She approached each situation with a level head and

a sense of humor, and solutions were generated with both safety and Onaway's mission in mind. The three of us often find ourselves wondering how Mrs. Conolly would react to situations and problems as we navigate our own teaching, counseling, and social work careers.

Honor is an Onaway core value and something that campers and counselors frequently refer to and strive for throughout the summer. Honesty, integrity, trust, loyalty, and responsibility are the qualities the board chose to describe honor. While it is the campers who are rewarded for their honorable behavior throughout the summer with patches, it is Mrs.

Conolly who set both the example and standard. She approached relationships with campers and counselors from a place of trust and loyalty and encouraged us to take on increasing responsibilities. She taught the value of hard and honest work and provided opportunities for personal and professional growth. Mrs. Conolly inspired us to incorporate honor in our jobs, schooling, and lives outside of camp.

Mrs. Conolly taught us about healthy, balanced leadership. We all feel we try to emulate her leadership style in our own lives, one that embraced growth, creativity and risk taking. Mrs. Conolly's confidence in her counselors encouraged them to develop their programs creatively and understand their personal strengths and challenges by just getting out there and trying it. Always a supportive voice, she encouraged her counselors especially (although this applies to campers and aides as well!) to understand themselves better through their work, always providing a safe place to fall. It was through that continuous support that Mrs. Conolly so deeply impacted our roles as Assistant Director, and also helped us each carve our own professional path.

When preparing a toast this summer, we managed to get our hands on some of Mrs. Conolly's activity reports from her camper days. Miss Stiles and the counselors did not mince words. Her dance counselor wrote, "Anne does not have good control of her body. She has trouble coordinating her arms and legs and needs to build up bodily strength. Anne though uncoordinated tries hard. Anne is not a graceful dancer. Her sense of rhythm is fairly good, but I imagine she looks much better on a tennis court." Reading these reports reminded us

that we are all works in progress. Moreover, camp asks us to do things that may be out of our comfort zone, but it is in those moments that we grow the most. Both of these lessons are so important in a world that too often prizes immediate gratification and results over hard work and growth. Mrs. Conolly always embraced a growth mindset when working with campers, aides and counselors alike, accepting that through our challenges in life (both in and out of the Woodland Dance class), we all deserve that opportunity to learn and grow.

The three of us feel extremely grateful for the opportunity to work so closely with and learn from Mrs. Conolly. We could go on forever sharing stories and lessons we have learned but would be remiss not to include fun. Working and spending the summer with Mrs. Conolly was a blast. She was able to laugh at herself, made jokes in meetings, and truly appreciated the humor of those around her. We are confident that she will continue to share her fun-loving and eager spirit throughout her retirement and are extremely grateful for her dedication to Onaway and her campers and counselors, for the lessons she taught us, and for the joy she shared with us. Cheers to Mrs. Conolly! \square

A LOOK AT THE SUMMER OF 2015

I approached this summer, my last as Director, with the goal of making it feel "normal" - like every other summer. Enthusiastic campers, dedicated staff, appropriate challenges, and simple living are all core ingredients to an Onaway summer and all were present in full force. Our 88 campers were from 21 states and 5 foreign countries. We had 26 counselors, 99% of whom had Onaway backgrounds, and 9 Aides were practicing and learning to be counselors in just a few years. For the first time since 2008, two OWLES sessions went out with a total of ten girls. There were 19 pairs of sisters and over 50 members of the community had a mother, grandmother or aunt who attended Onaway.



After a cool start, the summer was sunny and warm so I believe we may have had only one red dot day all summer. Winds were variable and kept the waterfront staff guessing which boats should and shouldn't be out on the water, but there was always someone launching from a very busy beach. Four girls swam the length of the lake, six passed their 3rd crescents in boating, five became captains in sailing, one passed her white chevron and eight girls passed their sharks, the highest swim level. Three amazing productions were put on by the campers: *And Then There Were None* by the Upper Camp over Fair Weekend, *Peter Pan* by the Lower Camp over Cup Weekend, and *Songs from Wicked* as the Dance Pageant. Such talent everywhere!

We had many alumnae visitors this summer and quite a few prospective campers toured. Miss Valerie Farias Newton's dancers came to perform, the Circle Camp used our lean-to several nights for overnight trips for their girls, and Miss Gevvie Stone took a few days off from her intensive Olympic training to help out at camp. The rowers loved getting pointers from a pro and of course her blondies at dinner were welcomed with shouts of delight. Mrs. Hollister (aka Helen Stokes Greven) visited on Tradition Day and confused campers and counselors alike with her realistic account of how "she" started camp 105 years ago. On Sunday she invited campers to have tea in Hollister House. Two members of Skytops 1965 returned to camp for a first ever 50th Skytops reunion. What fun stories they had to share.

The counselor office changed and we are all thankful for the airy, open space.

Ms Pendergast spent the week with us preparing for her new role as Director.

That's a change for me, for her and for the entire camp. Miss Ebes will go from working with lucky girls like you to infants and toddlers at risk in Baltimore.

Counselors have returned to camp in changing roles. The old counselor cabin in the woods has been converted to a much appreciated technical theater space. The wood

We welcomed the new campers and what they added to the community. We welcomed the spontaneous moments of laughter and of awe. And we appreciated all the things that were not new and that made us feel at home and safe at Onaway. From the same chapel talk:

We think of Onaway as a place that does not or should not ever change and in some ways that is true. We never want the simplicity and beauty of the property to change. Seeing the tall pine trees and the tiny cabins in the woods when we arrive at camp is comforting – it makes us feel safe. We work hard to make sure the lake does not change – that it continues to be clean and clear. Our traditions at Onaway rarely change and also make us feel secure. Bedtime would not be the same without Circle. Meals would feel different if we didn't sing grace. How could we change beaning to Camp Inspection? What would Fair be without the dunk? Our core values of honor, respect and community have not changed. Mabel Hollister articulated them over 100 years ago and we continue to build our summer around them.



And so I am grateful for a summer that was both "normal" and "new." By the time of this printing, the office will have moved to Philadelphia and Ms Pendergast will be on her way to creating the magic for the summer of 2016. I know that everyone will welcome her and offer the same support that I have enjoyed for the last twelve years. On-on-on! □


Our photography program needs some more 35mm film (yes, film!) cameras.



Our Onaway community knows no borders- as evidenced by two of our alumnae living life abroad as part of the U.S. Foreign Service. We asked Meg Tweedy Drazek and Ecy McIlvain Hughes to tell us a bit about their experiences, and how they've both stayed connected with Onaway and brought pieces of Onaway with them on their travels.

Tell us a bit about where you live now and where you've been posted in the past.

Meg: I joined the Department of State in 1999 and since then I have lived in Moscow, New Delhi, Prague, The Netherlands, Baghdad and Luxembourg (where I am now), as well as DC. When I joined I loved the idea of living overseas as a lifestyle; immersing oneself in foreign cultures and regular personal and professional changes. Ultimately I've found that, for me, change itself has been the real opportunity. Opportunity to try new things, learn new languages, take jobs that are both fascinating and tough. This job gives you the ability to keep challenging and reinventing yourself. My two favorite tours were Moscow and Baghdad and they were the hardest in many ways, but the most rewarding professionally as they punched me right out of my comfort zone and were, consequently, so rewarding in success. Trying new things and being open to the good, bad and ugly about yourself, and learning from it, using it, and moving forward strong were things that Onaway first showed me how to do.

Ecy: I have lived in the tiny little capital "city" of Belmopan in the Central American country of Belize on the Caribbean Sea for nearly two years. In a few more months we will move again, but we won't know where for another month at least, right now we are "worldwide available" and it is both unsettling and exhilarating. Before moving here we spent 7 months right outside DC in Rosslyn, Virginia while my husband Mr. Matt, who studied for the Bar Exam in the Onaway dining hall and drove a

van to Catholic Mass while I was the nurse in 2006 and who is now a Foreign Service Officer with the US Department of State, learned Spanish and I became a Co-active Life Coach! Before that we lived in Kathmandu, Nepal for two wonderful years.

How have you kept connected to Onaway?

Ecy: Onaway is the most important thing in my life after my family. Since joining the FS I haven't been back to Camp but my very best friends are my Onaway friends. I always say that the boating and improv and knots and camp craft skills are really wonderful takeaways from our years at camp, but the adult women friends are my absolutely priceless gifts from Onaway. I am very grateful for Facebook connections and the Circle Facebook group which have made it so that my adult women Onaways are not only friends from my Camp years but also new connections I have made with women who were at Onaway at other times. Helen Greven's gorgeous book was my favorite Christmas present this year, and I am excited for my daughters

to go to Camp in a few more years.

Meg: I haven't really stayed as close to Onaway as I would have liked to. And in fact, I think that's a wonderful part of our community: inclusion. Ideally we'd all be in the loop with camp and each other through each stage of our life, but our lives run on so many rich, interesting, diverse paths, that's not always possible. My experience in being away and "returning" to camp was a warm and welcoming one, and I love that about the community of women who founded their lives on the values we learned together around a campfire. Onas shouldn't be afraid to come back and contribute, reconnect, support Onaway or just reminisce if they've been away. I hope this makes us a richer community, and accepting of the many choices women make in their lives.

What Onaway lessons or traditions resonate the most with you?

Ecy: In the Foreign Service we talk a lot about "home" being a state of mind, and Onaway is absolutely the name of that part of me that feels like home. When I am feeling off balance because of cultural differences, distance from old friends, the constant effort of self-employment or the demands of motherhood, I can connect to the Onaway inside of me. It is calm there and beautiful and tidy and joyful and it gives me the strength and resilience to face the next big or little challenge. So much of my life can be about remembering what was or anticipating what's next and Onaway ("To us your name means Wide Awake, Means better girls of us to make") reminds me to stay present and mindful and grounded. No matter what my circumstances in this crazy life of nomadic exploration, I am always happiest when I am remembering to stay Wide Awake.

Meg: Onaway taught me to fail. Yep. To fail and in so doing, to try again and build success. I was a terrible camper my first summer, and a legacy to boot. I was afraid, and I failed in big

ways and small because of the fear. My next three summers as a camper got successively better and contained key moments which changed the essence of who I am today. Really. But guess what, in my first summer as a counselor, I failed again. New stage in life, new misunderstandings, and I fell short. But again, I got my second, third and fourth chance and each summer was better and better. I've never really been afraid to fail since. I have tried to avoid it, certainly, but because of Onaway I knew that even if I did fail, it was a waypoint, not a definition. Taking away the fear brought freedom to succeed. And ultimately, this taught me to forgive as well, and support others through their failures and onward. I believe that I would not have the life I do without this major lesson from Onaway and I'm so glad camp is still there, untouched, for others to mine for their own lessons and be supported at such a deeply developmental stage in life. Girls, now more than ever, need to remember to "be strong" and carry on. Thanks Onaway, may you strong and ageless be! □
