However, we also hear stories of hope, resilience, compassion, and even joy! At Onaway. I learned to find the silver lining in the difficult moments, to make lemonade out of lemons, to find hope in the unknown. While these seeds were planted when I was 11, at the beginning of my Onaway journey, Onaway still nurtures my resilience and calls upon me to give all that I can to help nurture these attributes in our girls and young women today. I have no doubt that our wide circle of alumnae, parents, and friends are able to tap into that same well of strength during this uncertain time.

In the spring, we made the unfathomable decision that it was not feasible to bring our campers and counselors to camp for the 2020 season. It was devastating for me, the staff, the board, the parents, and the girls to have a place and a community we all love so deeply, one that raises up young girls and women and moves them forward, be so unexpectedly taken away. We know the alumnae community wept with us – we felt the power of the wider Onaway circle caring for those campers who lost a summer at camp when they needed it most. But, we are Onaway, and we are strong! Determined to support the girls, we turned a heartbreaking situation into a new, creative experience. Onaway teaches us, in both big and small ways, to not turn away from a struggle but to face it. Earlier generations of intrepid girls and women forged difficult paths before us and now it was our turn to face perhaps the biggest challenge in our lifetimes.

Pivoting to a virtual camp experience, the staff and council set to work making a new kind of Onaway magic. Their goal was for the girls to connect with old and new camp friends, learn from their counselors and aides, and feel the Onaway spirit. Assistant Director Miss Merry Richter led the counselors who rightly focused on the traditions, values, and Onaway spirit as they developed fun and interesting programming for the girls. Miss Jane Lindstrom built a delightful website that captured our hearts and inspired us all to keep going. And the icing on the cake... all the campers who logged in, who wrote thank yous and poems, jumped into activities and rose to weekly challenges! They brought smiles to our faces and warmed our hearts. We will not soon forget those giggly Wendies and their special Birch Bark Box poem:

While our Virtual Camp Onaway 2020 council gathered and engaged the campers, the staff worked with purpose on projects and preparations for the summer of 2021. The staff and board reevaluated essential strategic planning and reprioritized projects and maintenance on our fiveyear facilities plan. We collaborated and strengthened our ties with the New Hampshire Camp Association, the

American Camping Association, and the New Hampshire Department of Health and Human Services. Onaway is turning over every stone and planning with conviction to be prepared for next summer.



Onaway Trustees and staff including our dedicated property manager, Mr. Gene Ronikier, reassessed our project timelines and moved swiftly to respond to the pandemic. Our campus-wide septic improvement plan continues and includes a new system beneath the tetherball courts which serves the Counselor Office, Maintenance Shop, Wendies, Hilltops, and Bunker Senior and Bunker Junior (aides cabins). We have installed two new toilets and sinks between Woodworking and the Waterfront that will also pump into that central system.



Also, diligently overseen by our environmental and wetlands expert Dan Geiger, we restored the stream at the waterfront between the Hollister and main camp beaches. After a few days of heavy rains in October, we were delighted to see the stream flowing naturally from the wetlands into the lake and back again. In the spring, plantings that support the restoration will ensure the



banks do not erode and the girls will have a healthy ecosystem to investigate through the Nature program. Finally, and with deep thanks to some very generous donors, Onaway was in a position to implement our plans to build a new infirmary sooner than we expected. With camp being virtual, we were able to begin construction in early August, ensuring that the new health center, known as Forty Winks, will be open and allow the nurses to give the best possible care to the girls in 2021.



As I look back over the past nine months, I am astounded by how our world has changed. I am deeply grateful that Onaway has endured, thanks to the support of so many people. Her values resonate in every corner of the globe where Onaway alumnae live, love, and make positive change. I have greatly appreciated all the emails, notes, and thoughts of love and encouragement I've received. My gratitude to each and every one of you. We thank you for giving us the support and encouragement, from near and far, to Be Strong!

# Hiding in Plain Sight

A s we share with the Onaway community the many exciting projects on campus in this newsletter, we want to take a moment to highlight the tremendous contributions of one of our alumnae, Sarah Mudge. Sarah, affectionately known to her friends as Smudge, was a camper, aide, and counselor in the 1970s and Onaway mom of Addy Havener-Mudge in the 2010s.

More recently, Sarah has worked closely with the Onaway staff and Onaway's Land and Lakes Committee to design the replacements of several aging buildings that greatly needed attention. Sarah's impact began when she designed the display cabinets in the Onaway Library for showcasing some of Onaway's historical pieces. She then went on to design the rebuilds of the Counselor Office in 2015, Hawke's Nest in 2016, Hollister Cabin in 2018, and the Laketops counselor cabin in 2019.

Sarah's appreciation for Onaway's history and simple, rustic style has guided her designs, resulting in new buildings that seamlessly blend with the old and nestle into our Onaway campus. Our beautiful new health center, Forty Winks, is the culmination of Sarah's many, many hours of listening to the staff, coordinating with our construction company, understanding Onaway's traditional architecture, and seeing to every finishing detail in the building. Sarah has managed to hide her talent in plain sight as she honors the needs of the counselors, campers, and staff while quietly and generously giving her tremendous talent and time to Onaway.

We are deeply grateful to Sarah and cannot wait for campers, families, and alumnae to see the tremendous impact of Sarah's good work.

# Virtual Camp 2020 - Though Far From Your Shores

When it became clear last March that the pandemic would affect the coming camp season, Ms. Pendergast assembled a task force whose main mission was to figure out if and how we could open camp safely for Summer 2020. Meeting biweekly, we dived into the nitty-gritty of imagining how to run a 7-week,



5-week, 4-week, or 3-week program. We discussed every operational detail of every scenario. Would parents be allowed up the hill on Opening Day, or even out of their cars? How would we handle uniform distribution and laundry? The questions were endless and the answers uncertain as COVID-19 information changed daily, and we tried to prepare for all possibilities.

In the end, once we received the guidelines from the CDC and the governor of New Hampshire, we realized that if camp opened, our traditions would be greatly altered and our values--honor, simplicity, spirituality/love, community, and self-discovery--compromised. What if

some girls could not travel to camp this summer or if they showed up on Opening Day and had a slightly elevated temperature? How could we turn those girls away from connecting with Onaway this summer? How could we ensure that in spite of circumstances outside of her control, each camper still felt love and acceptance from her Onaway community? All of these questions were really difficult to take in. Onaway is about so much more than eating Mount Washington Hot Bread on a Sunday morning, learning how to swim the front crawl, and playing jacks on the Farmhouse porch. This is why we embraced the concept of Virtual Camp

2020 ; we wanted to put together something in which all community members could participate so as to really connect during a summer where we all really needed Onaway.

Our virtual camp program consisted of three weekly live Zoom sessions - Evening Program on Friday nights, Cabin Group Time on Sunday afternoons, and the Rock on Sunday evenings as well as an incredible website (designed and built by Miss Jane Lindstrom) full of songs, recipes, and <u>activity videos</u> created by the counselors and aides of 2020. This allowed for everyone, no matter where they were or what COVID-19 restrictions they

faced, to engage with Onaway. It also still allowed for the counselors and aides to share their gifts and their creativity with the whole community.

There are so many important traditions at Onaway, and unfortunately many of them would not translate well to a virtual space. However, after seeing many religious services continuing over Zoom this spring, we knew we could continue to provide a peaceful and reflective chapel service in this new setting. Because of the limited internet connection throughout camp, we weren't able to stream a live service from the Onaway Chapel, but we hope the recorded videos we produced throughout the summer allowed the Onaway community to take part in a


new way while remaining true to our value of Spirituality and Love.

With the help of camper Addie Hanrahan and her father Mike, the new Pasquaney Director, we recorded all of the prayers as well as some video footage of chapel, the rock, and the lake to include as a background for all of the music. Under the guidance of Miss Becca Supple several counselors contributed recordings of each of the weekly hymns for viewers to sing along with as well as processional and recessional music. Miss Becca also put together a recording of the anthem each week, for which campers and counselors alike submitted recordings. Although Chapel this summer was pre-recorded, we were still able to include campers in the music as well as in the Skytops prayer, which Miss Meg Davies coordinated along with the counselor and aides readings. Ms. Pendergast's chapel talks, edited together with the readings and music, focused each service on one of Onaway's values.



One benefit of posting virtual <u>Chapel videos</u> is that they could reach a wider audience online and remain available to be enjoyed throughout the year. If you would like to take a few moments of reflection during these crazy times, you can find all of the summer's Chapel videos online here. Enjoy the natural scenery, sing along with the hymns, and remember to Be Strong! (Password is perfectday)

Another tradition we were able to continue in altered form this summer was the Girls of Onaway Donation (G.O.O.D.) meals. A couple of years ago, G.O.O.D meals started as a way to educate our camp community on how different cultures manage food insecurity and limited resources. Simple, inexpensive meals that are common in other countries are selected once a week, and the money saved is donated to our Girls of Onaway Fund. This summer Miss Josephine and Miss Eliza compiled four recipes from different cultures, filmed cooking tutorials, and posted cultural information on the Virtual Camp website. The meals this past summer included <u>Pupusas</u> (El Salvador), Shakshuka (Yemen), Lassi (India), and Falafel (Lebanon). The counselors were so excited to make the G.O.O.D. meals a part of the 2020 camp season and hope everyone enjoyed their weekly posts!



Aides are an integral part of the camp community, supporting counselors in running Onaway's everyday operations, forming meaningful relationships with campers and sharing their unique personalities and skills with the Onaway community. In light of our inability to return to camp grounds this summer and the importance of the aides program to Onaway, it seemed imperative the counselors recreate the program, virtual style. One task the aides undertook was creating and producing activity videos for all the campers to enjoy. This creativity again presented itself in the aides project, which brought many camp traditions to our screens in a humorous and fun <u>'Gong Show' video</u> that we know put smiles on everyone's faces.



To complement the aides experiences throughout virtual camp, the aides counselors developed three workshops on Leadership, Core Values, and Child Psychology, to give the aides the confidence and tools to tackle their responsibilities. From inspiring quotes and TedTalks, to discussion points, activities and key concepts, the

workshops comprised a diverse range of educational mediums to learn about the three topics. The discussions generated by the workshops continued into the weekly aides meetings, where individual activities and group projects were developed, and thoughts about the previous week shared amongst the group.

Though technology is typically left behind when we return to camp each year, we are incredibly grateful for what it allowed us to do this past summer. Without it and the creative powers of the Council of 2020, we truly do not know if we could have made the magic of Onaway come to life. Although challenges arose when



communicating over screens, we learned to expect them, work through them, and appreciate the sense of community we were able to maintain throughout the summer, though far from Onaway's shores.

Zoom calls would be on certain days and times. The links to each Zoom call were included. There was also a bingo board of activities for the campers to complete. I think she just liked seeing who the counselors were and getting a little sneak peek into their personalities. It was a connection she was craving since the virus had hit. She also completed bingo almost every week. She wrote a poem in the Birch Bark Box and sang in the virtual choir. It was like camp was happening on a tiny screen and it was great! Chloe enjoyed all the activities and I was glad she had a little bit of camp this summer. She was nervous about her first year at Onaway, and now she is counting down the days to next summer. As a parent and alum, I couldn't have been happier. The Virtual Camp was an amazing way to spread a little bit of Onaway. Traditions were upheld, schedules were made and kept, Onaway voices were spread across the Internet. Usually, Onaway is all about unplugging for the summer and spending time with friends and focusing on what is important. However, this summer everyone plugged in to ĥave an Onaway experience. Jenn grew up in Maryland and has an Economics undergraduate degree from Duke University, where she graduated in 2007.



# William Jackson Trustee 1979 - 1991

How do you say goodbye to someone so kind and thoughtful? In 2016, Jane Johnson Kent and I went to visit Bill and Mary Jackson at their residence at Edgehill in Stamford, Connecticut on our way to an Onaway board meeting. They were gracious and welcoming as always. We reminisced for quite a while about our time on the Onaway Board of Trustees together. I remember riding with them to meetings especially when we were involved with the 75th Anniversary Campaign in the late 1980s. Bill served as head of the finance committee, had insightful thoughts, and kept the board on track financially.



Bill grew up in Scarsdale, NY and was friends

with Ray Brown, another past trustee and Onaway parent. As a young man, he attended Camp Dudley in New York, so he definitely understood the value of a camp experience. He attended Deerfield Academy and went on to Princeton as an engineering major. World War II disrupted his college career but he participated in the V12 program where he trained as a Naval Officer. He worked for Bonney Forge which became part of Gulf and Western. He was brilliant and received many patents. He traveled overseas opening factories abroad. He was quite accomplished in his career and we were lucky to have him join the Onaway Board of Trustees.

Bill and his late wife Mary served as trustees initially while Susan attended camp and Lisa Taylor was director. They continued on when Carol Southall became director. They were loyal supporters of Onaway. They lived in Allentown, PA where Susan and Fred grew up.

He is the father of alumna and past trustee Susan Jackson and current trustee Fred Jackson, and grandfather of alumna Katie (Kajax) Jackson. We are deeply grateful to have known such a wonderful gentleman. His love of Onaway lives on through his family and friends.

Over the past seven months, Circle Program has had to meet the challenges that have come with COVID-19. We found that we had to get creative in order to continue to support our participants. This summer, taking as much as we could from our existing plans for summer camp, we created a virtual camp experience which we called Circle Camp @ Home. Our virtual camp ran for



the same length of time as any year. In order for the campers to have all of the materials they needed for the programming we created, they each received a package delivered by staff and mentors with supplies for that week's activities. The activities centered around Nature, Art, STEAM and mindfulness. Nature consisted of Leave No Trace activities and a daily challenge that encouraged everyone to get outside. Art used natural elements from outside to create things like nature mandalas and wall hangings. For STEAM we had a large focus on NASA and watched the launch of the rover together! We had numerous guest presenters who offered activities such as yoga, glass blowing demonstrations, NASA presentations, and a presentation on the natural history of bats. Every Friday night, participants and mentors gathered for a virtual campfire!

Since camp has ended, we have been able to have a few in-person gatherings such as the Akwaaba Ensemble, an African drum and dance ensemble led by Theo Martey. The performance was attended by campers and their families as well as their mentors. In September, we had the pleasure of having the Heartfelt Quilters Guild, who

traditionally join us at camp and present handmade quilts. Each Circle participant is able to pick the quilt that speaks to their heart. We are so grateful to be



able to carry on this tradition!

Our most recent adventure was small group hikes up the Col Trail, which Circle Program adopted for the 50th Anniversary of Earth Day this spring! This fall, we also started our first ever virtual Homework Helpers to provide 1:1 homework support for anyone who wanted it. We have been able to help with geography, box multiplication, and science projects!

All of our new programming wouldn't be possible without having our mentors right there along with us. Their ideas have helped us put together some really fun and interesting virtual events this past spring. Our mentors have also been connecting with their mentees in a variety of new ways such as: taking virtual art lessons from their mentee, virtual baking sessions, virtual museum and aquarium tours, and virtual games. We have always all come together to empower and enrich the lives of our Circle girls and this year has been no different, we are just getting more creative in how we do it!



# Coping with COVID-19

In the following piece, an alumna chronicles her experience during the early months of the pandemic. Robin Rice came to Onaway in the '60s from the Marion Rice Dance Company in Fitchburg, MA and taught dance at camp from 1967 - 1969. #### TWENTY-EIGHT DAYS AND COUNTING While hiding from the novel coronavirus By Robin Rice

I used to be a morning person. Now when I open my eyes I need the lure of sunlight against a brightening blue sky to convince me to get up. Another rainy, grey, or mostly cloudy day just doesn't cut it. Another reason for my reluctance to face a new day is that I need all the strength I can muster to get through each one. My older body now requires eight hours of sleep and I have two poorly trained cats. I have already been up! (and down and up and down) multiple times between 4 and 7 a.m. One wants out to hunt; the other wants out to nibble grass; both want in to be fed; then my "fraidy cat" who was just out and instantly scared inside by a wind gust, say, wants out again because she must go dig in the vegetable bed. It's a problem. . . but not really . . . in this unprecedented shelter-at-home and social-distance reality that is a pandemic.

I never had to deal much with the morning cat circus before the coronavirus, aka COVID-19. My partner, Michael, was frequently here and willingly took that shift. Now, at my request - on March 11th when coronavirus caseloads started to heat up in Massachusetts and Connecticut - Michael and I have each been riding this one out alone: he's on Martha's Vineyard and I'm in Clarks Falls. My thinking: with a 50% less chance of one of us bringing the virus home to infect the other, wouldn't we both be safer apart? We'll see. And when will it be safe to reunite? For any of us? - the question that surely haunts all those separated from those they love. When can we all be tested? Will negative results or shared immunity allow us to hold each other again?

My days alone are all over the place, metaphorically speaking. Twenty-eight days ago, however, is the last day I actually went anyplace. Entering the crowded Pawcatuck, CT Stop & Stop at 7:30 a.m. with gloved hands and no mask, I discovered large blue arrows painted on aisle floors (nobody spoke to me as I raced unaware up and down the aisles the wrong way for half my visit), more blue marks designating 6-feet apart checkout line locations, and Plexiglas panels separating cashiers from customers. A robot roamed the store. I didn't understand why my cart was wrested from my proprietary grip and replaced with another until I saw sanitizing wipes appear. A remarkably

pleasant cashier, given my angst on display, had her own concerns. She wouldn't touch my rewards card, scanning it from afar, or help enable me to complete my debit card transaction by pushing some button I'd missed. Can one use cash in this time of coronavirus? Did I say Michael always did our grocery shopping?

Making my way to the Westerly Walgreens (boldly ignoring a new Rhode Island sign on Route 78 mandating All Traffic Turn Left At Intersection and turning right anyway), I was shaken to see the drive-thru closed because of a broken microphone. Really? I couldn't get in and out of the store with meds for months fast enough in my freshly gloved hands . . . and do I wish I had brought a mask. My final stop, Hopkinton Liquor Mart in Ashaway, RI proved to be a breeze and assured me wine for weeks. Now all set to go nowhere for as long as I can stand, it was time to deal with my feelings potentially being all over the place . . . at home. <u>Click here to read the full</u> article.




