his past summer, we were reminded again and again about the power of play in the growth and development of our campers. Since returning to in-person camp in 2021, our campers' needs have changed. Living through a pandemic and navigating the post-pandemic world during critical developmental years has created new challenges but ones that overnight summer camps are well-poised to support. We know that the prior two school years were filled with lost opportunities, social isolation, and virtual school. At camp, we have been fortunate for two summers to provide campers with a fully in-person, fun, nurturing, social outlet to counter these challenging times. And this summer, we got serious about getting back to play! In doing so, we cultivated social confidence and independence in our campers through meaningful interactions in a nurturing but challenging environment with a healthy dose of laughter and fun.

We found more campers needing to decompress after the school year. The enjoyment of building connection through play was a powerful antidote to the sometimes overly focused end-result-driven academic lives of our campers. We still provide campers many opportunities to focus on achievement and skill building, and while we saw campers meeting our highest levels and pursuing our most challenging trips and long-distance lake swims, we also saw our campers' very clear need to simply play and be creative. For Evening Program on some nights, we opened up the Waterfront to hang out, play in the lake, and make s'mores on the beach. We also encouraged cabin group bonding privileges before taps once a week so that everyone got enough small group time together, followed by a full night of sleep. Cabin group counselors gauged what their group needed most that week and planned accordingly-whether a cozy read-aloud in the counselor's cabin or a dance party in Woodland Hall. And sometimes, two smaller groups, like the Wendies and Skytops, would enjoy an evening together. I think all of us who attended Onaway as younger campers remember our first Skytops group-so accomplished and confident. And in our final camper summers, we can recall the joy of receiving admiration and love from younger campers and the honor and responsibility of being good role models for them. That extra play between our youngest and oldest campers was welcome! Playing, creating, and team building together develop so many skills our campers will need later in life. How often do we hear leaders lament the lack of empathy, creative problem-solving, tenacity, initiative, and communication skills in the incoming workforce? After dinner each night, we have downtime in the center of camp before Evening Program. Groups of campers often play tennis, tetherball, or football, walk on stilts, shoot hoops, chat in the Library, pull out a Fiber & Textile Arts project, or draw. And, at Evening Program, we often gather in mixed age groups to create an improvisational skit. One Evening Program that always draws laughs is "First Line, Last Line." Just as it sounds, the group is given the first line and the last line of a skit, and they have to create the middle. What a wonderful collection of creative solutions they always come up with!

Our play together also allows for an incredible amount of team building and trust building. After a few weeks, campers learn that counselors and peers encourage them and laugh with them. They learn that the success of the group can be sweeter than the success of an individual. In this environment, campers start to open up, reveal their true selves, and gain an incredible amount of confidence in the process. We were thrilled to welcome families back to camp for the Onaway Fair this summer, and the campers poured themselves into the creative teamwork process of preparing all the fun and games for this day, which was full of playing! As well, the Upper Camp Play was an especially creative production, as you'll read about later in this newsletter.

Our world needs more creative, thoughtful, collaborative, and imaginative citizens and leaders. Reading the alumnae news every year and seeing how Onaway alums lead and serve in their careers and communities is testimony to the impact of an Onaway education, even if it was only a small part of their life experience. Over and over, we hear alumnae speak about the ways Onaway influenced their values, habits, career choices, and work or leadership styles. Our Onaway lifestyle, from camp duties to activities, to a quiet cabin group privilege at night, provides a good model for a healthy work-life balance. So when you feel overwhelmed with the fast pace and worries of life, perhaps consider a fun evening program or a quiet privilege with family or friends, or just go outside and play!

Meeting the Challenges of Today's World

ummer camps continue to be an oasis in a child's challenging world, a safe place for uninhibited fun, self-discovery, and spreading their wings. At the same time, all educators, including my peers at other overnight summer camps, are talking and sharing about the secondary impact of the pandemic in the form of increased behavioral and mental health challenges, particularly manifesting in some form of anxiety. Our world, after all, was turned upside down in 2020. Hence, we made some very specific changes to our training for staff so they were better prepared for a more complicated range of challenges. In addition to what's in their camp trunks, campers arrive with more than just the tangible items on the packing list. Prior to the campers' arrival, we asked parents extensive questions so that we could best understand the intangible load their child might be carrying. Of course, being prepared for the unexpected is also part of our job.

Thus, one of my goals this summer was to have as many resources as possible for times when those loads became a little too heavy. Our counselors participated in workshops on anxiety, disordered eating, neurodiversity, behavior management, and trauma-informed care. We partnered with a longtime camp director and consultant, Emily Golinsky, for some of our training sessions. Counselors learned new ways of seeing children and learned that camper behavior is helpful information for understanding how to best help them grow and thrive. We were also extremely fortunate to have Alisha Saini on the staff this summer. Alisha (Skytops 2006) was a camper, OWLE, aide, counselor, and OWLE counselor. She is a middle school counselor at Excel Academy Charter School and worked at camp three days a week this summer. Alisha was available to the staff and campers for one-on-one

conversations to brainstorm strategies to solve problems, work through roommate conflicts, and simply play games together as a means of sorting out concerns or calming worries. While most of the issues that crossed her desk were not high-level concerns, we all appreciated the extra attention to the social-emotional health of individuals in our community.

We were also fortunate that Tyler Dillard (Skytops 2008) returned for her second summer on the staff after more than a decade away following her summer as an aide. Tyler returned to help train our counselors and lead our DEIB (Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging) initiatives at camp. As camp becomes more diverse, we seek to grow and understand every member of our community, and to ensure everyone feels welcome and able to thrive. While staying true to our cherished roots, our goal is to consider how to move through the challenges we face with honesty, sensitivity, courage, and love-the way Onaway has always strived to face issues. We assume good intent, we create a culture of "call in" rather than "call out", and we try to deeply understand and respect one another in order to provide the time, space, and guidance for every camper to discover their best self. I am immensely grateful to Miss Tyler for creating a culture of caring conversation that allows us to move past places where so many communities can get stuck.

While Onaway has never claimed to be perfect, we have always been an intentional community dedicated to our core values and our mission of preparing girls to meet the challenges of today's world. I am honored, with the support of our dedicated staff and trustees who span many generations, to build upon a century of caring, passionate, and visionary leadership that defines our history and reminds us to be wide awake.














he Upper Camp Play this year was a smashing success! The Play That Goes Wrong is a slapstick comedy about a poorly funded and under-rehearsed British theater company that stumbles through a performance of The Murder at Haversham Manor, a tacky murder mystery. It is a play about a play, so the fourth wall is constantly broken as the actors struggle to remember their lines and attempt to act through numerous set malfunctions. The campers involved, therefore, had to play two parts: the actor themselves AND the actor playing the role of their murder mystery character. The campers really got into the improvisational aspect of the play, and dare I say (although I am biased) it was one of the most ambitious and hilarious Upper Camp Plays yet!

Having an established set with various structural problems (i.e. set pieces falling down "accidentally" and actors getting hit with doors) was a necessary aspect of the slapstick comedy we were trying to achieve. With help from Mr. Gene, Miss Jane, Aides Elizabeth and Rebecca, and a group of wonderful campers, Woodland was transformed into another set. The walls were repainted, a door was placed in the middle slat for official entrances, and amazing camper-drawn artwork was hung on pegs that could be pulled backstage by the crew, thereby "falling" without anyone on stage touching them. In my 10 Onaway years, from camper to counselor, I had never


seen such an impressive set design, and it is all thanks to the collaboration between interested and talented staff, counselors, and campers!

Onaway Wilderness Leadership Experience

o sign up for OWLEs is to sign up for a summer full of adventures: paddles down rivers and between islands in canoes and sea kayaks, backpacking trips over steep and slippery mountains, and rocky ascents up seaside cliffs. But to sign up for OWLEs is also to sign up for a summer full of big belly laughs, tears of accomplishment, perpetually sweaty socks, burnt fried rice, curious seal sightings, van sing-a-longs, heart-opening conversations, 24 hours of quiet reflection in the forest, and opportunities to rise to your true potential as a leader and a young woman.

This summer, we had two sessions chock-full of eager adventurers, ready to dive into whatever came their way. At the start of each session, with their backpacks expertly packed, the OWLEs loaded up our white van and set off for wilderness living. Over the course of the next three weeks, we drove over 700 miles and hiked, walked, and paddled our way through Maine and New Hampshire. Each group had a chance to give back to the lands we love so much, first with some hearty squishing around Quincy Bog, pulling out invasive irises, and then on the trails of Little Sugarloaf, fighting erosion with expertly placed boulders.

We kept the Onaway spirit very much alive throughout our travels; on our backpacking sections, we sang renditions of our favorite camp songs to pass the time as we traversed steep and challenging trails. We also proudly donned our brown and whites, though by the end of our time in the mud at Quincy Bog, they were certainly more brown than white.

A highlight of the summer included our two days of guided rock climbing in Acadia National Park. For many OWLEs, it was their first time climbing, and they naturally approached the rocky cliffs with a sense of trepidation. By the end of day two, however, each girl was confidently belaying another, and their foot placements and confidence had both drastically improved. To wrap up the rock climbing sections, we drove to a little seaside cove and took a dip in the icy ocean water, before skipping over to Bar Harbor where we enjoyed some well-deserved ice cream.

A moment of growth for the OWLEs on the second session came when, after backpacking through the Mahoosuc Notch–famed by some to be the hardest mile on the Ap-

palachian Trail—we arrived at our campsite only to find all tent spots occupied. We filled our bellies with warm ramen noodles and took a collective deep breath, practicing the life skill of remaining calm despite less-than-ideal circumstances. With some critical thinking, the OWLEs figured out how to squeeze our group of 8 in among the other hikers. Together, they sought out empty spots for their tents and communicated with those around them to figure out how to respace and reorganize. This opportunity certainly gave them a chance to practice their developing leadership skills.

One of the biggest factors on any OWLE trip is the rotating schedule of Leaders of the Day (LOD). Each OWLE gets two or three chances at being LOD, which includes tasks such as waking people up in the morning, setting the schedule, delegating various necessary camp tasks, and navigating - whether that be via road atlas, topographic map, or sea kayaking chart. In turn, each OWLE practiced finding and using her leadership voice. At the end of the day, we gathered to share feedback and reflect on what went well, as well as areas for improvement. It's rare that a young woman has an entire day to confidently step into a leadership role, with unrivaled support from her fellow teammates. How special it was to see each OWLE embrace her own, unique style of leadership this summer.

Goodbyes at the end of an Onaway summer are well known for their copious amounts of tears and tight hugs, and the end of OWLEs this summer was no different. As we departed, one OWLE remarked on the value of learning to work as a team, in a way that is different and more intense than a typical camper summer. She described how incredible it was to be able to rely on others in the group for support, while simultaneously developing the skills and inner strength to return that support. It was a glorious thing to watch each group first figure out their kinks and communication styles, and then become a well-oiled, gleeful machine. There is no doubt that the individual and team-based strengths the OWLEs developed this summer will be widely utilized in their aide and counselor summers. It's safe to say that OWLEs 2022 was a roaring success, and we cannot wait to see what comes next.



Circle Program to Celebrate its 30th Anniversary

rom its humble beginnings of a one-week session at Camp Onaway in 1993, the Circle Program is now situated on its own shores of Spectacle Pond in Hebron, NH, and is running three camp sessions, one three-week session for 9- to 11-year-old girls, one two week session for teens 12-14 years of age, and one one week adventure programming session for 15 - 18 years of age. There is space for 36 girls in each session with a short break between them. This year's numbers were a bit lower than in the past as Circle made plans for full capacity after the pandemic.

News of Summer 2022:

Six Circle alumni returned to be counselors. This fulfilled a long-sought goal and is very important to the program's strength.

The program for 28 girls ages 9-11 concentrated on "in" camp activities with some huge progress in swimming which enabled a few girls to swim across the pond and two who actually swam over and back!! Other activities included arts and crafts, drama, games, and sessions with visiting instructors in yoga, nature, and various other activities.

The Teen Program of 18 girls ages 12-14 concentrated on nature, art, hiking, and boating for most of their two weeks at camp. The girls were very enthusiastic about these activities and felt a great deal of accomplishment, and they grew in physical strength and increased confidence. In addition, the girls were taught interviewing techniques to find a job, and how to fill out an application and find references.







The Teen Adventure Program for teens now follows each Circle girl through high school graduation. During the summer they enjoy hiking in the White Mountains, swimming and boating on Newfound Lake, and telling stories around a nightly campfire. Her mentor continues to keep in touch, and the girls can reach out for help with applying to colleges or helping with future plans post-high school.

Mentors visited their mentees twice during the summer, joined them for supper, and participated in the evening program. Outside of the camp season, each girl sees her mentor twice a month and at the girls' monthly gatherings. The Onaway connection continues to be very important to the Circle Program, and with the arrival of their new director, Beth Dever, there is fresh energy, ideas, and commitment coming out of the office. The growth and mission of the program should make all Onaway alumnae and families feel very proud, as they are part of an organization that supports so many young girls in the surrounding areas of New Hampshire.

Circle Program was founded by Camp Onaway in 1993 and is a separate 501(c) (3) nonprofit organization. To learn more about the Circle Program, visit www.circleprogram.org.



IT'S OFFICIAL!

Over the past three years, the Onaway year-round staff has been working towards becoming accredited by the American Camp Association (ACA). This requires an in-depth self-evaluation of our program and administrative policies and procedures and a peer review process, in order to meet the requirements for accreditation. We began the process back in 2019, but with COVID-19 and the lead-up to Summer 2021 requiring more of everyone, we hit pause until we recovered the time needed to resume this past spring. The main purpose of the ACA accreditation program is to educate camp leaders in the administration of key aspects of camp operation, particularly those related to program quality and the health and safety of campers and staff. The standards establish guidelines for implementing policies, procedures, and practices. While our office manager Beth Beckman did most of the heavy lifting on this project, achieving this accreditation would not have been possible without the support of the kitchen team, health center team, maintenance team, and the council. We all know how positive and impactful a summer at Onaway can be, and becoming accredited helps families feel even more confident in their decision to send their child to Onaway.

Based on that connection, Tara took a nine-year-old Em to an Onaway open house in D.C., Em wrote up a list of "The Top Ten Reasons I should go to Onaway this summer," and the rest is history.

Something Tara values deeply about her time in the Peace Corps is the community that developed in the absence of electricity and media. There was time to sit around and talk with people she never would have met in other circumstances - they shared everything about each other's lives and families and formed deep bonds, and she's drawn to Onaway's similar values of simplicity, community, and character building. Tara will serve on the Governance Committee.

his is a truly transformational and historic time for Onaway. We have climbed the mountains of two distinct fundraising efforts simultaneously — the always-essential annual Onaway Fund which supports the camp's day-to-day operations, and the WIDE AWAKE Capital Campaign which is rebuilding or renovating 100-year-old buildings. Both efforts also contribute to our ability to provide tuition assistance to approximately one-third of our camp families.

To name just a few of the much-needed improvements we made this past year, the WIDE AWAKE Campaign enabled us to build another new septic system and construct and furnish two new senior staff cabins. With help from the Onaway Fund, we rebuilt two crumbling camper cabins and built a new 2-holer (toilets) in Bunker Junior, refurbished a wooden rowboat, and installed a generator. With your support, we also provided over \$100,000 in financial assistance, ensuring that cost was not a barrier for any camper who could benefit from an Onaway education.

While we had an almost "normal" summer, the pandemic continued to put enormous stress on the cost of maintaining and operating the camp this past year. On behalf of the staff, trustees, council, and campers, thank you for your generous contributions of time, talent, and treasure!






